FY 19 Budget Ordinance Adopted

The commissioners approved the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget Ordinance on June 19, 2018 following a brief public hearing with only one speaker, Moore County Schools Superintendent Dr. Robert Grimesey, who heartily endorsed the recommended budget. The approved budget maintains the General Fund tax rate at 46.5 cents per \$100 valuation, includes a one penny rate increase for Advanced Life Support to 4 cents per \$100 valuation, and includes a 1/2 cent increase to the Rural Fire Protection Service District rate to 9.5 cents per \$100 valuation. The budget is balanced at \$142,990,258 and is effective July 1, 2018. Click [HERE](#) for more details/information.

Bond Campaign Volunteers Recognized

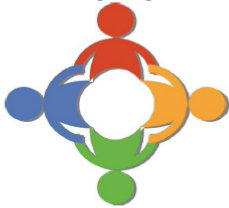
The Board took official action on June 5 declaring the result of the bond referendum held on May 8, 2018, whereby the issuance of \$103,000,000 in School Bonds and \$20,000,000 in College bonds was approved. On behalf of the Board, Chair Catherine Graham thanked them and all those who could not be present at the meeting.

Health Department Recognized for Reaccreditation Designation

The commissioners recognized the Moore County Health Department during the June 5 regular meeting for receiving reaccreditation from the NC Local Health Department Accreditation Board. North Carolina is the first state in the country to mandate accreditation for its local health departments. The purpose is to assure a basic level of capacity and services. The reaccreditation process included three components—a self-assessment completed by the agency, a site visit by a multidisciplinary team of peers to review performance standards, and determination of accreditation status by an independent accreditation board. Commissioner Louis Gregory, who serves on the Moore County Board of Health, said he was very pleased about the designation. He commended the Health Director and employees and said he enjoyed being part of the organization. The next reaccreditation process will be in 2022.
